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Lessons on Liberty By Barry Hess

Lesson 1: The fundamental Principle of Self-Ownership

There can be no understanding of libertarianism without first understanding its founding principle; that of self-ownership by every individual. Without fully understanding this basic principle, from which all other natural rights spring, there can be no understanding of libertarian philosophy. Those who do not understand this basic principle are often heard saying they "lean" libertarian, or that they agree with our philosophy except for some specific part.

But what these people are really saying is that they don't understand libertarianism at all. This principle is inflexible and does not lend itself to partial belief, so essentially what these people are saying is that they want to be completely honest...part of the time.

The libertarian philosophy is an all or nothing philosophy, you either believe that each individual is sovereign unto themselves, or you don't. This is precisely what separates libertarians from all other politicians.

Just as you cannot lean toward the truth, you cannot lean libertarian without becoming absorbed by it.

The absolute right to self-ownership is rooted

soundly in the notion of equality of each and every individual. When two babies are born side-by-side neither can be said to have any authority over the other at all, yet all other political parties depend on the notion that some people are superior to others, and that there is some form of authority to which all individuals must sacrifice their personal sovereignty, or the disposition of their property outside of their bodies.

Self-ownership is an absolute right. That means very simply that only the individual has any legitimacy in determining what that individual does to, or puts into their body. In effect libertarianism respects the right of each individual to make their own decisions, it even protects their right to do what most people would think were stupid things as long as they do not harm another person, or impede the owner's use of their property.

It's a simple philosophy and it depends on the acceptance of something we call the "N.A.P." or the "Non-Aggression Principle", it means we reject the initiation of force against another individual or their property. Some people call it the "live and let live" philosophy, and that adequately describes this principle.

This is important to note, because as the first political philosophy on the North American continent, the American founders wanted to be crystal clear that the government was owned and accountable to the people, and that the government and its official duties were strictly limited.

Unfortunately as time went on people in government stretched their influence beyond the authority assigned to them in the Constitution, and today we wrestle constantly against those who seek power over other people and their property.
